Editorial

Floods and Natural Disasters

Perspective of the Developing Economy

A basic correlation--adverse relationship between natural disasters and developing economy accelerates poverty, brings progress to a standstill and drops off production and living standards, and this circumstance makes the third world countries fail to overcome the catastrophic gap, whereas, underdeveloped countries collapse one step behind the well-off-circle every calamity. In Bangladesh, due to floods droughts, storms and heat waves and other disasters lose about 400 thousand million taka worth of assets or production, which negatively affects 6.3 million people with life and livelihood each year as well [Source: the Climate Risk Index Report 2025].

Irrational human activities call in all calamities, especially--the aggression of capitalism made people drive away from morality. As a result, in the pursuit of temporary wealth and satisfaction, they cut down forests, wipe out mountains and hills and fill up the rivers, canals and ditches and set up industrial factories to the way of urbanization. The impact of cruel capitalism—to get more profit and money, people desperately keep on multiple shifts in industries, which discharges harmful gases--chlorofluorocarbons, carbon monoxide, carbon dioxide, and so on at maximum levels that destroy the ozone layer and ecological balance, and swell up global warming with succession.

For faster and unethical expansion of the developed countries, one percent of the richest people give off carbon equal to 66 percent of the poorest people in the world [Source: Research Paper-25, Oxfam]. As a downbeat reaction--various epidemics and natural misfortunes enter in the world, which produce adverse outcome on the developing countries like Bangladesh. While the developed countries can easily cope with global disasters and epidemics, but in the case of developing and less developed countries--every disaster and epidemic causes extreme shocks and suffering among the nations.

Conversely, geographical position, as a major factor, is responsible to bring out disasters in our country, explicitly--the Himalayas is in the north of Bangladesh; the Bay of Bengal in the south; the maximum number of rivers flow through the country in a meandering manner from India or Nepal; in our southern region, there are no obstacles like hills, mountains, that would stand as a strong barrier to natural disasters--cyclones and tidal waves; most of our land is made up of flood plains; our country is located near the border of the India and Myanmar plates (gigantic plates existing inside the earth--is also prone to earthquakes; and furthermore Bangladesh is located in a tropical monsoon climate zone; which all—occur disasters: floods, cyclones, river erosion, landslides, and the like [Source: Earth Sciences, Oxford University].

Developing countries get more suffering and losses--more than 95 percent of deaths occurs and wealth is lost 20 times higher than rich countries in floods or any other natural disasters. Since low-income countries like Bangladesh do not have well-built buildings and good plans to handle the emergencies. Rather, these countries take post-disaster measures. Hence, in developing countries including Bangladesh, floods or other natural disasters—pose large vulnerability and fatalities [Source: United Nations and World Bank Disaster Risk Management].

We have no power to get rid of the natural disasters, but, early warning and public awareness can diminish the losses to a large extent. In Bangladesh, proper research conduction on the type, trend, intensity and reality of disasters is necessary to scrutinize and adopt early caution, emergency funds forming, permanently transferring people from disaster-prone areas to safe the places by government and private sectors. And more efficient and appropriate use of all foreign funds for climate and environmental conservation is urgently vital. In this way, it is possible--to protect the country and the nation from the black clutches of the natural disaster. In this issue, the development organizations are expected to come forward.

On 21 August 2024, all of a sudden, a horrible disaster: flood appeared in the eastern part of Bangladesh from the Indian province following deep and rapid tide, which caused heavy and nonstop rainfall and overflowed 11 districts--Sylhet, Moulovibazar, Habigani, Feni, Khagrachari, Cox's Bazar, Cumilla, Noakhali, Chittagong, Laxmipur and Brahmanbaria of the country. Simultaneously--this situation also affected low-lying part of five districts of the southeastern and eastern parts of the country with short-term flood.



The dreadful flood, in the recorded history, flooded over about 8 lakh 87 thousand 629 families in 11 districts of the country, which distressed roughly 5.4 million people. Houses, livestock farms, agro cropping fields, educational and religious institutions, offices, and shops and markets were gone under the water. The rivers, canals and ponds get overflowed. Roads and communication systems were destroyed. Thousands of people and animals floated away and the unlimited suffering, misery and death toll continuously went with increase. People spent their days without foods, sleeping and fear of death. Darkness and cries were all around--it was like a death valley. Children, old and women fell into more problems. Humanity wept bitterly, and pleading and request drifted away in the air. In this circumstances, the government and non-govt. bodies stood by the flood-affected people with suitable initiatives. Several national and international organizations stepped forward to cope with the crisis. Development organizations put relief and rehabilitation activities into effective in the region on an emergency basis.

SSS' Spontaneous Humanity and Rehabilitation Activities

SSS, since inception, has been keeping welfare and people-friendly activities into application, and always stands by the general people in various disasters and misery. In this context, there is a regular special program--Disaster Management, Relief and Rehabilitation Program in the organization.

The unexpected flood in August 2024 immerses the 11 districts of the country in where, a total of 107 branch offices of SSS fell on solemn trouble with about 150,000 families. Mr. Abdul Hamid Bhuiyan, Executive Director, SSS wept for the flood-stricken families from the cardiac-hole, and instantaneously called an emergency meeting with the senior officials of the organization. In the meeting, he took quick and inclusive steps to rehabilitate the flood-affected families.

Inclusive Approach in Rehabilitation

The honorable Executive Director of SSS, through wise thinking, took up special approach to bring the flood-affected families--both members of the organization and non-members back to the normal situation. The holistic rehabilitation mechanism pursuing--grants to the Chief Advisor's Relief and Welfare Fund, providing food and livelihood goods, organizing medical camps and providing necessary medicines, organizing livestock medical camps and providing free medicines and fodders, developing infrastructure (agro-fishery-livestock farms, house repairing, installing tube-well and latrine), distributing agro-inputs, providing necessary advice and making awake to control the situation, disbursing easy and soft loan, providing cash grants for rehabilitation, and so forth is applied.



Relief and Rehabilitation Activities of SSS in Detail

SSS announced BDT 60 million as grant-in-aid to conduct the aforesaid relief and rehabilitation activities, which was spent at various levels—is meticulously illustrated below:

Making Contribute to the Chief Advisor's Relief and Welfare Fund: In company with the organization, the employees of the organization tried to forward the helping hand to the flood-affected families through donating BDT 10 million tantamount to their one-day salary to the Chief Advisor's Relief and Welfare Fund of the Interim Government on 27 August 2024.

Foods and livelihood Items Distribution:

The organization, by a allocation of BDT 15 million, distributed foods and livelihood items--rice, pulses, chira, potatoes, oil, dates, salt, sugar, gas-light, candle, orsaline, powdered milk, biscuits, etc among 10,584 families, which would help the families stay alive at least seven days.

Concurrently a total of 8,071 families got baby foods, whereas more than 400 students of a madrasa took up benefit of cooked food.

Distribution foods and livelihood items--rice, pulses, chira, potatoes, oil, dates, salt, sugar, gas-light, candle, orsaline, powdered milk, biscuits, etc among 10,584 families.

Providing Healthcare: The organization, to protect the health of the flood-affected people, organized medical camps and endowed with necessary medicine free-of-cost, which benefited 34,974 people, and BDT 2.22 million and 26 thousand was spent in this purpose.



Distributing Cash Money: The organization handed out BDT 21.89 million 6 thousand among 21 thousand 8 hundred 96 families (one thousand per family) as financial assistance for quick rehabilitation in the field of agriculture, fisheries, livestock, house repair, water, sanitation, etc in the flood-stricken region. In addition, throughout a field survey on the repairing the homestead and installing sanitation and tube wells urgently, 106 families were actually identified and provided them totally with BDT 1 million and 60 thousand—10 thousand per family. Overall spending on cash money donation of the organization was figured out BDT 22.9 million and 56 thousand for rehabilitation as well.

Arranged medical camps and endowed with necessary medicine free-of-cost, which benefited 34,974 people, and BDT 2.22 million and 26 thousand was spent in this purpose.

The organization handed out BDT 21.89 million 6 thousand among 21 thousand 8 hundred 96 families (one thousand per family) as financial assistance for quick rehabilitation

A Livestock Medical Camp Organized in the Flood-Affected Area

Arranging Livestock Camp and Distributing Fodder and Medicine: Necessary initiatives are taken for the protection and development of the livestock in the flood-affected areas. The livestock development program of the organization, organized free livestock camps and gave out medicine in 107 branches free-of-cost in the flood-affected areas financed by PKSF. In collaboration with the upazila livestock departments and veterinary hospitals, the mentioned camps were conducted.

Besides, the organization, to prevent the affected cattle from the upcoming diseases, distributed a set of crucial vaccines and tablets among the farmers in the affected area. Especially, vaccines against scabies, scurvy, black quarter, lumpy-skin and hemorrhagic septicemia for cows, PPR and goat-pox vaccines for goats and sheep, de-worming tablets, and Virulent Newcastle and plague vaccines for hens and ducks were distributed. Necessary advice was provided to the affected farmers with growing awareness.

Agro-inputs Distribution: Vegetable seeds (spinach, red cabbage, radish, gourd, sweet pumpkin, chili, lady's finger, bitter gourd, beans and eggplant) of BDT 4.9 million and 65 thousand were distributed among the flood-affected families to achieve self-sufficiency in food. Seeds worth BDT 4.9 million 65 thousand were distributed to 30 thousand families.

Providing Easy and Soft Loan: The organization, to keep the affected families active in income-generating activities, provided easy and soft loan with demand-based regular loan to the flood-affected members. In particulars, the opportunity to take disaster (Sahash) loan was provided on soft terms. The organization has initially planning to disburse BDT 300 million as the Sahash (disaster loan) loan product.


The organization, organized free livestock camps and gave out medicine in 107 branches in the flood-affected areas financed by PKSF.




